## From the Senior Warden....

***“...But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust do not break through or steal. For where your treasure is, there will heart be also...” Matthew 6:20-21 (Sermon on the Mount)***

Like some of you, I purchased a mega-millions ticket (or tickets) this past January with the expectation of winning the \$300 million plus jackpot. I recall leaving the store, numbers in hand, feeling nothing but lucky! Somehow I knew I would win, despite the indescribable odds... how the excitement bubbled up inside me! Secretly, I donated my imaginary winnings to family, friends, charities and church....keeping only a modest portion for any personal pleasure or comfort. Oh my, a worry-free retirement, that fabulous dream vacation, home improvements, college funds for grand kids. What a legacy...I would certainly be remembered for my generous and giving heart! (not to mention, all that money!) Well, my dreams were dashed with just that one random roll of the dice, or should I say, the roll of numbers---not one match. Was it wrong to pray for all that money, especially if it would have been put to so much good? Well, hearing the words of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount as presented in Matthew's gospel, probably. It's a dilemma, faith and money. I don't necessarily think Jesus thinks that wealth is evil as much as the human condition that arises in it's acquisition and distribution. Shouldn't we be focused on the right kind of treasures? The Bible does refer to some wealthy folks with whom the Lord finds favor: King Solomon, Zacchaeus the tax collector, Joseph of Arimathea to name a few. Perhaps this was because their hearts were transformed through the Holy Spirit, becoming invested in the eternity of Heaven, rather than the temporal riches found on Earth.

Peter J. Gomes, author of the best-selling *“The Good Book- Reading the Bible with Mind and Heart”* tells us: “To be ‘rich toward God’ is to realize that this is the only wealth that counts. Wealth is thus neither having nor getting. Wealth for the Christian begins with receiving that which

## From the Curate....

The first weekend in January, I introduced the Gospel of Matthew, which we will be reading on Sundays throughout the coming year. I explored who Jesus was for Matthew's community, and who the people of Matthew's community were because of their relationship with Jesus. I then asked, “Who is Jesus for us at Grace? Who are we, because of our relationship with Jesus? What is “The Gospel (good news) According to Grace?”

Becoming part of Grace has shaped my own answers to these questions. I explained that since coming to Grace, I really understand what Paul meant when he said that we are the Body of Christ. When we the people of Grace are together, I see Christ feeding people through you: at the food pantry, and at the Community Breakfast, at Connect, and at the Top of the Hill dinners. When we the people of Grace are together, I see Christ clothing people through you, at the Thrift Shop. When we, the people of Grace are together, I see Christ gathering the children to himself. When we, the people of Grace are together, I see Christ bringing about justice through Grace Justice Ministry. I see Jesus pouring grace onto us, blessing us with gifts we could never ask for. And I see Jesus pouring grace into New Bedford and beyond *through us*, and using us as instruments of God's grace.

In Grace Justice Ministry, we have been listening to the concerns and pressures faced by people at Grace. The big three issues that emerged were jobs, public safety, and education. We've seen a particular passion around education. And this made sense to me. I see how much the people of Grace value children and youth. Whether or not we have our own children, we are enriched by the ministry of the youth at the altar, and in so many areas of our parish life. And we can also see how improving education could have a positive ripple effect on jobs and public safety. It just so happens that five other UIA-affiliated congregations in New Bedford are interested in working on education, too. Imagine Grace working to improve education, not only for our own kids, but also for

God is generous enough to give, and from that wealth all charity proceeds." But even as people of faith, we do seem to make a big deal about money. Mr. Gomes points out the significance of the Offertory in the Protestant church's service---and all the activity that takes place around it: the exchanging of peace and announcements proceeding it, the presentation of God's gifts of bread and wine, the movement of ushers, the singing of songs, the collection of monies for the work of the church, and finally the gathering at the table to share a holy meal. Our offertory seems to signal the beginning of group participation! I found it interesting that the author was raised in a Baptist church in which two offerings were taken: the first taken by the trustees signifying those monies would go toward the running of the church(business) and the second taken at the time of Communion by the deacons for the poor and needy(pastoral).

So, ok, I lost that mega millions lottery...but I am NOT lost to the Kingdom. It's here and it's now. Life at Grace offers many riches, my friends. To be a part of the sights and sounds of the living God, is a truly a feast for the senses!

The pictures that scripture paints, the comfort and closeness that liturgy provides, the inspiration of spoken word and music, the healing power of bread and wine from loving hands, they are all priceless commodities in my eyes. In the new year, I invite us to use all of our senses to welcome God more deeply into our hearts. Perhaps we will listen more intently, sing more loudly, volunteer more freely. Let's indulge ourselves in all of Grace's riches so that we are more fully equipped to share the wealth of Christ's love with our weary world. And let's not stress about lotteries lost. After all, we already hold the winning ticket...the gift that truly keeps on giving, *for eternity*. Now that is good news!

### **FEBRUARY 2010 SEASON OF EPIPHANY**

The liturgical seasons, unlike the secular seasons, are not always the same length of time. They are not tied to exact dates on the calendar, with the exception of Christmas Season which is always December 25<sup>th</sup> through January 5<sup>th</sup>. The rest of the liturgical year is dependent on the date of Easter, which usually, but not always, is the same week as Passover. This year Easter is very late, so that Lent does not start until March 9<sup>th</sup>. The season of Epiphany starts with January 6<sup>th</sup> and continues until Ash Wednesday, which means it can be anywhere from four to nine weeks long. This year it is nine weeks long and thus the whole month of February is still within Epiphany. Except for Epiphany itself and the first Sunday after Epiphany, which is also the Feast of the Baptism of Jesus, the season is considered to be "ordinary time"; the liturgical color for ordinary time is green.

The Sundays of February are the **Fifth after Epiphany**, February 5-6; the **Sixth after Epiphany**, February 12-13; the **Seventh after Epiphany**, (Children's Sunday) February 19-20; and the **Eighth after Epiphany**, February 26-27 respectively. We will be celebrating **Rite 13** Sunday on February 6<sup>th</sup>.

At the Holy Eucharist and Healing Service on Wednesdays in February we will be celebrating: **The Presentation of Jesus in the Temple** February 2<sup>nd</sup>; **Cornelius the Centurion** February 9<sup>th</sup>; **Sts. Cyril and Methodius** February 16<sup>th</sup>; and **Polycarp of Smyrna** February 23<sup>rd</sup>.

But it is I who must thank all of the lay ministers who gave their time and talent to making these services joyous and meaningful. Without them nothing would take place.
